Winslow Indian Health Care Center hosting 25th Annual Wellness Conference, 12th Annual Hózhóqo liná Youth Wellness Conference

WINSLOW, Ariz. — The Winslow Indian Health Care Center’s Health Promotion/Disease Prevention Program is hosting the 25th Annual Wellness Conference and the 12th Annual Hózhóqo liná Youth Wellness Conference on June 13 at Jeddito Public School and on June 20 at Dilcon Community School.

The conference will provide local communities and families with information about Ádaa háąh hasin bee hózhóqo iiná, which means to “Know your limits, stability and reflection through the beauty way of life.”

The conference is designed to share information and health education based on the Navajo traditional philosophy of Hózhóqo liná, Beauty Way of Life. Integrating Navajo cultural ways with Western concepts of health is important. By promoting Navajo cultural beliefs and using the four cardinal directions as a reference, conference attendees will aspire to elevate self-confidence and awareness in every day decision-making, which leads to an improved quality of life.

The goal is to help participants learn and gain knowledge of limits, stability and reflection of one’s self—Ádaa háąh hasin; to understand that kinship is stability—K’é bee siihasin; to learn and practice reflection—Siihasin; and to learn and gain knowledge of the Path of the Sun environment—Chahałtheeł.
